# 2011 Congressional Report Card

The Secular Coalition for America is pleased to present its report card for the U.S. House of Representatives for the 1st session of the 112th Congress. The Secular Coalition chose seven issues covering aspects of protecting and eroding religious liberty, religious privileging in law, discrimination against nontheistic Americans, the influence of religious dogma on the availability of health care and educational choices, and the effect of religious bias in science.

Please see **Legislation and Grading** for descriptions of the legislation that the House voted on and how and why the Secular Coalition graded each vote.

The Secular Coalition believes it is vital to hold elected officials accountable for every vote they cast on behalf of their constituents. The Secular Coalition urges all nontheistic and secular Americans and every American who believes in the separation of church and state to contact their U.S. Representative and ask him or her to account for the votes as presented in this report card.

## The Results\*

- Grade A: 17 Democrats, 0 Republicans
- Grade B: 55 Democrats, 0 Republicans
- Grade C: 110 Democrats, 6 Republicans
- Grade D: 5 Democrats, 5 Republicans
- Grade F: 3 Democrats, 230 Republicans

*\*The total will not be exactly 435 due to members who did not vote, who have left Congress, and who were absent.*

## The Grades

- No member of the House received a perfect score because of the voice vote for HR 473, the vote to approve a land conveyance to a Boy Scout council. Due to the fact that the House approved the conveyance by a voice vote, meaning no one asked for a record of the vote, the Secular Coalition chose to give every member of the House a negative score rather than not count this vote at all.
- The grades were calculated by the number of correct votes (as determined by the Secular Coalition) and then divided by the total number of votes taken by each individual member. So a member who voted all seven times, but only voted the correct way 5 times, received a score of 71 percent and an A grade. A member who voted only six times, but voted correctly four times, would receive a score of 67 percent and a B grade. It should be noted that some members who did not vote the full seven votes may have higher or lower grades than accurately reflects their stances on issues. This illustrates the importance of our elected officials doing their jobs—voting.

## To Be Noted

- A startling fact that emerged from the vote totals was the low number of Representatives who were present for all seven of the votes, which came at different times of the year. Of the 435 members of the House, and acknowledging Rep. Giffords' absence as well as the tradition of the Speaker of the House (Rep. Boehner) not to vote, and the partial terms of Representatives Amodei, Hahn, Hochul, and Robert Turner, only 279 Representatives voted in all seven votes—and that is giving all 433 members a pass on HR 473, which was a voice vote. At least 156 members of the House missed one or more votes.

- For Roll Call 601, the Church Investment Plan, about 28 percent of the House didn't vote. Of about 433 eligible members, 120 of them didn't bother to vote on this legislation. If they chose not to vote, their constituents should demand an accounting of their time.
- For Roll Call 816, the reaffirmation of "In God We Trust" as the national motto, nine members voted "nay" against 396 who voted "aye." While the Secular Coalition asserts the correct vote was "nay", we take particular issue with the 28 members who stated "present" or chose to not vote at all. We applaud the nine members for taking an unpopular stand and thank them for it. Alternatively we reproach the majority of the U.S. House of Representatives for voting "aye" on a measure that merely entrenches the idea that the Judeo-Christian God is favored in this country over all other gods and religions—and that being religious is akin to being patriotic. The Secular Coalition for America represents thousands of patriotic Americans who have no belief in any gods and simply ask their elected representatives to also represent them.

# Legislation and Grading

## RC 93

### H. Amdt. 95

**Explanation:** H. Amdt. 95 would have prohibited federal funds from going to Planned Parenthood Federation of America, Inc. Federal law already prohibits the use of federal funds for abortion, so this amendment would have prevented federal funds from being utilized by a national secular nonprofit organization that provides reproductive and health services.

**Amendment Status:** The amendment passed in the House.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves a “nay” vote:** This amendment cut all federal funding to a national nonprofit that provides comprehensive reproductive health services to both men and women. Planned Parenthood services millions of low-income and minority people across the United States. The only reason given for eliminating the funding was a religious preference that the organization cease providing abortions and abortion-related services, for which no federal funds were being used for anyway, and which constitute less than 2 percent of the organization’s activities. The result of this amendment would be to deny millions of women and men safe, scientifically sound, and reliable comprehensive reproductive health care.

## RC 204

### HR 471: Scholarships for Opportunity and Results Act.

**Explanation:** HR 471 would have re-authorized the federal voucher program for five years in the District of Columbia, providing \$12,000 for high school students and \$8,000 for elementary and middle school students for the 2011-2012 school year. In previous years, more than 80 percent of the vouchers were used for private religious schools.

**Bill Status:** This legislation passed in April under HR 1473, the Department of Defense and Full Year Continuing Appropriations Act, 2011. The House vote is recorded under Roll Call 268; the Senate vote number is 61.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves a “nay” vote:** The federal voucher program is forced upon the D.C. school district and allows more than 80 percent of the taxpayer funds to go to private religious schools. The Department of Education has studied student test scores repeatedly and found no difference between students attending the private schools with vouchers and public schools. The voucher amount is not enough for the majority of families to afford private secular schools, such as Sidwell Friends. However, churches and other houses of worship make their tuition match the amount of the voucher, in effect making the voucher a subsidy for private religious schools.

## RC 236

### H. Amdt. 245

**Explanation:** H. Amdt. 245 would have added a new section to the Congressional Acceptance of Scientific Findings: Congress accepts the scientific findings of the Environmental Protection Agency that climate change is occurring, is caused largely by human activities, and poses significant risks for public health and welfare.

**Amendment Status:** The amendment did not pass in the House.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves an “aye” vote:** Understanding science and technology are critical to every part of our society and economy—as well as the effect such understanding has on issues such as what to teach in schools, what drugs should be approved for the public, what should be considered civil rights. The constituency has a right to know how their elected officials stand on matters relating to science and research.

## **RC 601**

**HR 33:** Church Plan Investment Clarification Act.

**Explanation:** HR 33 would have amended the Securities Act of 1933 to allow certain securities issued in connection with retirement income accounts available only to certain kinds of church plans to be treated as exempted from registration and disclosure requirements under the Act. **Bill Status:** The bill passed in the House.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves a “nay” vote:** This measure offered no comparable exemption to secular nonprofits, resulting in a religious privilege in securities law for churches and clergy.

## **RC 673**

**HR 440:** To provide for the establishment of the Special Envoy to Promote Religious Freedom of Religious Minorities in the Near East and South Central Asia.

**Explanation:** HR 440 would have directed the president to appoint a special envoy to promote religious freedom of religious minorities in the Near East and South Central Asia within the State Department. It would require the Special Envoy to: (1) promote the right of religious freedom of religious minorities, denounce the violation of such right, and recommend appropriate U.S government responses to such violations; (2) monitor and combat acts of religious intolerance and incitement targeted against such religious minorities; (3) ensure that the needs of such religious minority communities are addressed, including economic and security needs directly tied to religious-based discrimination and persecution; (4) work with foreign governments of such countries to address inherently discriminatory laws; and (5) coordinate and assist in the preparation of specified reports required by the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 and the International Religious Freedom Act of 1998.

**Bill Status:** The bill passed in the House.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves an “aye” vote:** This measure allows the executive branch to act on behalf of religious minorities in areas of the world where they are being actively persecuted. Though nontheists are not mentioned, the Secular Coalition is lobbying for their inclusion.

## **RC 816**

**H. Con. Res. 13:** Reaffirming “In God We Trust” as the official motto of the United States and supporting and encouraging the public display of the national motto in all public buildings, public schools, and other government institutions.

**Resolution Status:** The bill passed in the House.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves a “nay” vote:** This resolution reaffirmed a national motto that excludes millions of Americans who do not believe in the Judeo-Christian god and encouraged an unconstitutional breach of separation of church and state by encouraging the motto to be displayed in every public building.

## **Voice Vote**

**HR 473:** Help to Access Land for the Education of Scouts or HALE Scouts Act.

**Explanation:** Would have required the conveyance of specified land in the Ouachita Nation Forest (Oklahoma), fair market value, to the Indian Nations Council, Inc., of the Boy Scouts of America—an organization that discriminates against nontheists.

**Bill Status:** The bill passed in the House.

**Why the Secular Coalition approves a “nay” vote:** The Boy Scouts of America actively discriminates against nontheistic children who want to join as well as parents and members of the community who wish to be part of the organization. Congress’ action prevents other groups who do not discriminate from bidding on the federal land and potentially costs taxpayers money. The end result is the group who will own the land that once belonged to all Americans will now actively prevent some Americans from being able to enjoy it.
